President's Message CAPT Kathy Bruyere, USN (Ret)

Happy New Year to all of you! I hope 2011 will be filled with good health, happy times and wonderful memories.

Rudy Shappee served on active duty with the Navy for 20 years. His career spanned the Cold War years of 1957 to 1976. During his career, he served aboard three aircraft carriers: USS Bennington (CVS-20); USS Independence (CV-62); and USS Bennington (CVA-64). After retirement, he enjoyed a 20-year career in public education at elementary, secondary and university levels. Upon the arrival of the USS Midway (CV-41) in San Diego Harbor, he left his teaching career to become a volunteer aboard the new naval aircraft carrier museum. He has assisted in the restoration of the ship, developed the basic philosophy for the educational program aboard, trained and managed the ship's outstanding Docents, and is now serving as Assistant Exhibits Manager for the museum. He will discuss his new book "*Beef Stew for 2500: Feeding Our Navy from the Revolutionary War to the Present.*" Expect him to provide a lively explanation of how the U.S. Navy feeds the crews of its busy ships at sea from the Revolutionary War to the present, showing how food was prepared aboard and abroad during periods of conflict in our nation's history.

Legislative Update

Pentagon Defends Proposed Cuts Pentagon leaders provided only a glimmer of clarity on the proposed \$178 billion in cuts and efficiencies over the next five years at a Wednesday hearing before the House Armed Services Committee. The DoD proposal came under immediate fire that the cuts may be too deep. Chairman Howard McKeon (R-CA) opened the hearing stating, "I will not support any measures that stress our forces and jeopardize the lives of our men and women in uniform."

Deputy Secretary of Defense William Lynn and the Service vice chiefs of staff asserted the cuts would not undermine war-fighting capabilities. Lynn said the proposed efficiencies and cuts will allow the Services to reinvest \$100 billion into other military programs while the remaining \$78 billion is an actual reduction in the overall defense budget. The latter cut caught McKeon and other committee members off-guard.

The proposed five-year defense budget starts with a base 2012 budget of \$533 billion and modest growth over the next two years. The increase (over inflation) for 2013 and 2014 is projected to be 1 percent and .5 percent respectively, while 2015 and 2016 are expected to be flat based on planned reductions in the force.

Those cuts, which include an Army troop reduction of 27,000 troops and another 15-20,000 for the Marine Corps, are projected to come after the expected drawdown in Afghanistan.

Referencing the "enormous growth in our medical costs," Lynn stated, "...it is time to lift the 15-year freeze on TRICARE enrollment fees for working-age retirees." He said the Pentagon also will propose adjusting pharmacy co-pays and phasing out subsidies to a small number of non-military hospitals.

Specific details on proposed copays and other fees were not provided. Such details aren't expected until February 14, when the President will formally submit the 2012 budget to Congress.

President Talks Military Families On Monday,

MOAA President VADM Norb Ryan, Jr. (USN-Ret) was invited to attend a White House event at which President Obama, the First Lady and Dr. Jill Biden revealed a long-awaited report, "Strengthening our Military Families: Meeting America's Commitment." The report lays out the details of a government-wide approach to supporting and strengthening military families. It was first announced by Mrs. Obama in May of last year.

The new report identified four key areas that will be the focus of the effort:

- Enhancing military families' well-being and psychological health
- Developing military spouse career and education opportunities
- Increasing child care availability and quality of child care
- Improving education and development of military children

Government agencies that will partner in this "unprecedented commitment" will include the Departments of Education, Labor, Agriculture, Treasury, and Health and Human Services. Mr. Robert Gordon III, Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Military Community & Family Policy, emphasized the effort will require a "whole-nation approach," as DoD and the VA can't accomplish it alone.

Gordon said DoD has 200,000 military children in the child care system, but still faces a shortage of 37,000 child care spaces. Without access to quality childcare, military spouses have difficulties pursuing education and career goals, which have negative ripple effects for the whole family, especially in an environment of multiple deployments and PCS moves.

The President said he had asked troops during his December trip to Afghanistan what he could do to better support troops there. He was told, "Sir, take care of our families. If we know our families are all right back home, then we can do our jobs." He closed by calling on 100% of Americans to support this effort to demonstrate the nation's gratitude to troops and their families.

Military ID Cards at 65

Should you get a new military ID card at age 65 or not? MOAA recommends yes. Technically, it's not required but it may save you some grief down the line. ID cards for retired military members have an "indefinite" expiration date on the front of the card. On the back of the card is an expiration date for medical benefits that expires the month prior to you turning age 65. While your entitlement and access to medical benefits do not end after the expiration date, it could cause problems if you don't update your card.

MOAA recently received an email from a member who told us of his trip to the base pharmacy. He still used his original retired ID card with an expired medical date on the back. His card was confiscated by the pharmacy. Turns out, the base hospital implemented a local policy to confiscate cards in an effort to get cards updated for those over 65 years old.

In this fast paced, ever changing world, military ID cards have undergone several updates over the years, photos get old, and some service providers won't understand the date on the back doesn't render the card expired. People aren't ID card experts. An expired date means one thing to most; game over. Save yourself the potential grief and get a new card.

Centennial of Naval Aviation Activities

On February 17, 1911, inventor and aviation pioneer Glenn Curtiss taxied his seaplane to the battleship USS PENNSYLVANIA anchored in San Diego Bay. A boat hoisted the "hydroaeroplane" aboard the ship. Later, it was lowered to the water and Curtiss returned to North Island. This historic event, more than any other, prompted the Secretary of the Navy's decision to purchase the Navy's first aircraft.

In tribute to this and the 100 years of progress and achievement in Naval Aviation, hundreds of historic and current Navy aircraft will take to the skies **February 12, 2011**. Naval Air Station North Island - the official "Birthplace of Naval Aviation" - will provide prime viewing for this once-in-a-lifetime aerial review.

On February 12th the Air Station hosts a spectacular Open House event welcoming military and civilians aboard. Guests will stroll the runways to view historic static aircraft displays, enjoy the Aerial Review viewing, and take tours of the USS John C. Stennis aircraft carrier. The USS Midway Museum is promoting reserved seats on February 12 to see the "100th Anniversary Parade of Flight" from the Midway flight deck saying they will be almost under the flight path of the largest flyover since the end of World War II. Live entertainment will start at noon and the Navy's Parade of Flight beginning at 1:00pm. The Navy expects they will have more than 100 aircraft participating.

The Coronado Historical Association will participate in the Centennial of Naval Aviation with the unveiling of a themed museum exhibit, "Wings of Gold: Coronado and Naval Aviation" opening on February 4. The Association is also sponsoring a "Home Front" project that will identify homes in Coronado where Naval Aviators once lived, or currently live, with a "Home of a Naval Aviator" sign including a number referencing a brochure with a short bio of the aviator. The Coronado Library will be dedicating its exhibit space to the topic of Naval Aviation throughout 2011 with a series of displays tracing the history of Navy flight from its humble beginnings to today. Historic photographs, pilots' logbooks, uniforms, flight gear and other memorabilia will be on display at the library.
